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

The countdown is on! Can you believe there are 11 more days in the 2012-2013 school year to go!

It's been an eventful year on campus. A look back at this publication—the **WARRIOR NEWS**—tells of all the events that marked our year. We've had two book fairs, two festivals, visitors from Fisk University, Grandparents Day, Donuts with Dads, and Muffins with Moms.

The after school program serviced more than half of our student body. After school kept everyone busy. There were classes in art, dance, aerobics, cheerleading, flag twirling, and music. Athletic activities included basketball (girls and boys), track & field, and karate. They put on two outstanding showcases, displaying their talents, in the days leading up to the Christmas holidays and last week.

Our band and auxiliary marching units performed in four Mardi Gras parades—looking very polished, I might add. The Voices of FCWCS Choir and Recorder Ensemble performed at Celebration in the Oaks. Unfortunately, they were rained out last Friday at the New Orleans Jazz Fest. Just wait till next year . . .

The move into our new home has been the highlight of our year. We had been housed in the white trailers on the back of the school's lot since September 2007, our opening year. Our ribbon cutting was a grand event, with community leaders, neighbors, contractors, educational leaders, and parents in attendance.

With about 95,000 sq. ft., we now have the space to accommodate students wishing to eat breakfast at one time in the Warrior Café, instead of doing shifts of 10 minutes each morning. School assemblies are now comfortably held in the gymnasium. Our middle school students now have a place of adequate size to have after school dances. Our Warrior basketball teams—boys and girls—now have a court to practice on and truly a home court.

Our annual Black History Month now has a stage and the room to put on true theatrical productions. We're taking it to another level with our new facility.

We've got a library with about 7500 volumes. Next year, we will get our database up and running, thus allowing students to be able to borrow a book or two at a time to take home and enjoy.

We've got great neighbors in the congregation from Cornerstone United Methodist Church a few yards down Bullard. The men of Cornerstone have provided our students with good male role models, teaching chess and reading to our younger scholars about the Civil Rights Movement during the decades of the '50s, '60s, and '70s.

Our PTA marked their second year of leadership, with hard work to show for it. Our Board of Directors–C.L.A.S.S.–was the glue that held it all together.

Our school family is growing. We anticipate more than 50 new families joining us next year. We hope we can count on you to join our PTA and help to make our school flourish academically. Our scholars—your children—deserve it. Kelly S. Batiste, Principal/CEO

## From the Desk of Nurse Robichaux

Have you ever wondered how the topics are chosen for this column? There is an extensive list of annual health observation and recognition dates that can be found on the web. Between that list and what I feel are needs at FCWCS, the monthly topic is developed. May is known as Healthy Vision Month.

Can you think of life without sight? Think about the things you couldn't do or would have to make adjustments to perform them. For about 285 million people in the world, this is reality.

There are an estimated 19 million children in the world who are visually impaired. Most of these children live in developing countries.

The United States is not a developing country, but we are not immune to diseases of the eye. In Lousiana, cataracts, diabetic retinopathy, and glaucoma account for the largest number of those with impaired vision or blindness.

Children's eyes and vision are an important part of their development. Like the other parts of their bodies, their eyes should be examined regularly. Eye exams should begin at birth, with newborns checked for basic eye health by the pediatrician or family physician in the hospital nursery. Premature infants and other high-risk newborns, babies born into a family with history of eye problems, and obvious eye irregularities should be examined by an eye doctor without fail.

By the time a child enters FCWCS, he/she should have had their vision and eye alignment examined by their family doctor. Children who complain frequently of headaches should be seen by a doctor immediately. Classroom teachers often note students having difficulty with their vision. Signs that a child may have eye problems include:

• constant eye rubbing

- · extreme sensitivity to light
- · poor focusing
- inability to follow objects
- abnormal alignment or movement of eyes (after 1/2 year)
- · chronic redness of the eyes
- chronic tearing of the eyes
- a white pupil instead of black
- sitting too close to the TV or computer screen
- inability to see objects at a distance
- squinting
- · difficult reading
- inability to read the board in class

Watch your child for any of the above problems. Eye problems/diseases can be prevented and treated successfully when caught early.

Summer is an excellent time to have eyes examined. If there is a need for glasses or contacts, your child has time to adjust before school resumes in August. ###

#### LEAP Remediation Scheduled to Start Tuesday, May 28

Test scores are not back yet, but we anticipate a few Warriors who may need some additional assistance to reach their goal of BASIC in either Math or English Language Arts. Students in 4th and 8th grade must have a score of BASIC in Math or ELA to advance to the next grade.

4th and 8th grade students who were not successful during this spring's LEAP test will have an opportunity to retake the test.

Those students will be invited to take part in LEAP remediation at FCWCS, beginning Tuesday, May 28 at 8 a.m. (breakfast served at 7:30 a.m.). Classes will be held Monday (with the exception of Memorial Day, May 27) through Thursday. The sessions will conclude each day at 2:30 p.m. The test will be re-administered June 25-27. ####


#### Delta's Dedicate Dennison Reading Center

can master most academic subjects they are confronted with in school.

Today's students are expected to read and take notes in all their classes, including physical education. Try using a computer without the ability to read, it doesn't work! The computer and the Internet are all about information. Information is usually given with words.

Literacy Matters is an online education resource that states "in math, students must make sense of the technical vocabulary, complex information, and detailed directions contained in textbooks, articles, and documents such as graphs and harts."

everal generations ago, students ere expected to master reading by the sixth grade. That has changed. Instery of the written word should the obtained by grade 4 in order to be accessful with content-area abjects. This is referred to as reading to learn."

of course there are those who do to believe totally in this concept. eading specialists Marie Clay and P. David Pearson have questioned this direction in the instruction of reading. Their research indicates that this is not the best way to teach reading. "Learning to read and reading to learn should be taught at the same time, by practicing and applying reading strategies, as well as by deepening their knowledge of letter and sound relationships, word families, and spelling patterns," is the method advocated by Clay and Pearson (scholastic.com).

Many teachers in today's K-3 classrooms follow the best practices as favored by Clay and Pearson. Upper elementary (4-8) are also reinforcing K-3's instruction and employing strageties especially conceived for older students, such as teaching students how to decode multi-syllable words, enhancing their vocabulary by teaching roots, stems, prefixes, etc., teaching the structure and parts of content textbooks, analyzing and comparing texts to find common themes, etc.

Whatever methods are employed to teach reading, it is imperative that school and home partnership in developing this most basic skill in learning. Children today must become life-long learners. We no longer live in a world where people can get by without knowing how to read. The average worker will change careers about three times during their lifetimes. That means there will always be a need to learn something new by reading. Reading is and will continue to be an crucial life skill in the 21st century-one that can not be ### ignored.




