The Story Behind Black History Month

In 1640 the Virginia courts sentenced John Casor, an indentured black servant, to a life of slavery. In 1654 he became the first recognized legal slave in America. Enslaved by Anthony Johnson, a black man and former indentured servant himself. Other Africans (about 20 of them) brought to North America in 1619 have also been identified by some historians as the first enslaved in the New World.

Historians can't agree on this point—were the Africans in 1619 slaves or indentured servants? There was a difference indentured servants would not spend their entire lives in bondage. Slaves would.

What we do know is that the colony of Jamestown, Virginia needed manpower to aid in the production of moneymaking crops such as tobacco. The colonies had a abundance of land at hand, but lacked the manpower to make it work. Slaves soon became the muscle to build the new nation. Africans and later native born black Americans, would be the economic tool that America would use to build its wealth. Until 1863 and the Emancipation Proclamation, slavery would remain supreme in the United States. The Civil War ended "legalized" slavery in the USA. Congress passed the 13th Amendment

(1865) to the Constitution that officially abolished it. Fifty years later, in 1915, Dr. Carter G. Woodson, a Harvard educated African American with others, developed the idea of studying black life with a group known as The Association for the Study of Negro Life and History. They would later (in 1926) chose the second week in the month of February for their celebration because of the birthdates of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass occurred in that month and week.

The idea was embraced by black schools and communities all over the country. It provided the opportunity to remember the many achievements of black Americans. By the 1960s, the observation grew from a week to the entire month of February due to the influence of the Civil Rights Movement. Every president since Gerald R. Ford in 1976 has officially designated February as Black History Month. Technically it is designated National African American History Month by the federal government.

Woodson envisioned a time when a separate commemoration would not be needed in February for Black History. Dr. Woodson hoped it would be studied as an integral seamless part of American History, because Black History is American History. Maybe one day . . .

- **4. Fair** (plays by the rules, treats others with fairness . . .);
- **5. Caring** (shows compassion and empathy for others . . .);
- **6. A Good Citizen** (does what they can to make their community and school better, volunteers, respects authority, good neighbor
- 7. ...). Is this the child you're raising? We hope so! Help us to develop all our students into adults that we can be proud of. ###

Know your Black History . . .

-The practice of inoculation was introduced to America by the African born slave

Onesimus. The traditional African practice saved hundreds from a 18th century Boston smallpox epidemic;

-HBCUs were originally established to teach the former enslaved how to read and write;

-Booker T. Washington established HBCU Tuskegee in Alabama. Noted scientist George Washington Carver later becoming a member of the staff;

-In antebellum New Orleans, the enslaved at one time were allowed to dance and drum in the area known as **Congo**

Square on Sundays. ###
