Dear Fannie Family,


A few weeks again I penned a message to you regarding renewal of our charter to operate.





Dryades Branch (Colored) of the New Orleans Public Library (1915-1965)

Before desegregation, even the library system in New Orleans had limited access for African Americans. New Orleans had about six public libraries in the first decade of the 20th century.

There was only one branch of the library system where blacks could borrow books in the city of New Orleans. That was the Dryades Street branch of the New Orleans Public Library, located at 1924 Philip Street. Blacks were not able to visit the main library (then at Lee Circle) or any of its branches. The one exception to this rule—black lawyers could use the reference law books, but were not allowed to check out any books for pleasure reading. A library for "colored" patrons was needed during this era of Jim Crow.

The Dryades Street Branch was constructed in 1915 at a cost of \$25,000. It was financed by steel magnate Andrew Carnegie, who at the time was building scores of libraries all around the USA (his philanthropic foundation exists to this day—giving us the "seed money" for everything from Pell Grants to Sesame Street). Among the world's wealthiest men, Carnegie was prodded by Tulane University Professor James Hardy Dillard (the namesake of Dillard University) to pledge money for the construction of a library and its furnishings for the "colored" citizens of New Orleans. The land the building sits on was donated by the city of New Orleans.

On Saturday, October 24, 1915, the Dryades Street Library was dedicated. Henry M. Gill, the city librarian, called upon the every black civic leader in attendance to speak to the large audience there that day. The building's auditorium, for 50 years, would host African Americans of note visiting the city–Carter G. Woodson (1939) and Paul Robeson (1942)–to name two.

It would be almost 40 years before the system would construct another branch for blacks in New Orleans. In 1954, the Nora Navra Branch at 1902 St. Bernard Ave. was opened to accommodate the reading needs of citizens downtown. This occurred just as the 1954 Brown v. the Board of Education Supreme Court decision made Jim Crow Laws illegal.

The Dryades Branch now sits empty, heavily damaged in 1965 by Hurricane Betsy. It is now a local historical landmark and owned by the Dryades St. YMCA. It was rededicated in 1994 to return it to its original use as a community resource. ###


Warriors should never leave home without their tools—books, paper, and pencils! But if you couldn't get to the store to restock pencils at your home, we sell them daily.






Clean Team Does An Awesome Job . . .




