



Our 10th Annual Black History Program—From Slavery to Freedom: The Perseverance of the Negro—depicted the horrors of slavery, the courage of Harriet Tubman, the sacrifices of MLK, Jr., the brilliance of Madame C. J. Walker, the genius of Mae C. Jemison, the tragedy of Trayvon Martin and Sandra

Bland. 398 years of life in America was presented—the lows, but also the highs—giving hope to the generation of young people in our care. The props, acting, singing, stage direction, lighting, and music all helped to depict a storyline worthy of a well-done high school production. Good job to Ms. Regina Robinson and her crew! From the Desk of Nurse Cheryl Robichaux, R.N, B.S.N. Dear Warrior Family,

Most of you probably are aware that October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. But how many of you realize that March is known as National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month?

This cancer occurs in the colon (large or small intestines) or rectum. Caught early, it can be cured.

Colorectal Cancer affects African Americans more than any other ethnic group in the USA. Colorectal Cancer may occur at any age, but increases dramatically after the age of 45. Parents, please share this message with your parents. The median age is usually about 68 when diagnosed.

Being overweight, heavy alcohol usage, eating lots of red and processed meats (hot dogs, beef, lamb) may increase your risk. A diet rich in fruit, vegetables, and high-fiber grains may help reduce the odds of developing this cancer.



riders will need a parent/guardian to pick them up no later than 5:00 pm.





Our City is Rich in Culture . . .

One of the unique qualities of New Orleans is its rich traditions.

In the African American community it includes brass bands, Social Aid & Pleasure Clubs, the Baby Dolls, Skull and Bone Gangs and the Mardi Gras Indians.

On display in our school's lobby is the headless and breast plate of parent Corey Rayford of the Black Feather Tribe.

Mardi Gras Indians can be traced back to the 1880s in New Orleans. They are African Americans who are known for their colorful suits and headdresses. *(continues on left)*

Our City is Rich in Culture . . . (cont'd)

Mr. Rayford advised the **WN** that the headdress on display weighs in excess of 100 pounds. It took three men to anchor it in place.

Roughly 40 tribes can be found throughout the city and we have as part of our school family Mr. Rayford and his daughter, who take part in this celebration. Our para, Ms. S. Reynolds, has a son who also takes part in these festivities. Parents of young Indians are responsible, of course, for the expense and work that goes into constructing a suit.

It was feared that the custom would die out after the floods of 2005. But, just the opposite has happened. Super Sunday in Central City on St. Joseph's Day (March 19) was a testimony to that fact. Thousands of spectators lined the streets to witness the annual celebration.

What a great history lesson for our students to experience in their own hometown. ###

Tornado in New Orleans East Puts Disaster Plan to the Test

Tuesday, February 7 was predicted by meteorologists to be a less than stellar weather day.

It proved to be just that and more for our eastern community. By late morning, rain and wind were the precursor to what would ultimately be categorized as an EF-2 tornado, packing winds of 111 to 135 mph. It is the most powerful tornado to ever hit New Orleans.

Our school's action plan went into effect. Students on the second floor were brought downstairs and classes were moved into the windowless hallways. Students were even served lunch in the hallways, away from windows.

Unfortunately, our school neighbor, Schaumburg Elementary, received a direct hit. The students and staff of Schaumburg will be housed in Gaudet's old building until repairs are completed by next year. No injuries were reported. CAO Terri Williams congratulated

the staff on behalf of the leadership team. She stated in an e-mail that night, "you all are amazing! Today we hunkered down and prepared for the unexpected . . . Every staff member remained vigilant, alert, and compassionate. Thank you all for going above and beyond to ensure that our students were safe and calm . . ."



It is important that we have current contact information for all students enrolled. Parents were notified by an automated call that the school's bus service was unavailable due to the condition of Chef Menteur Hwy. We appreciate the cooperation of those parents who understood and were able to quickly come to school and pick up their kids. There were streets that we did not know the condition of the homes of our students and could not risk dropping them at a house where the tornado had hit. Several of our students were victims of this unusual weather condition for New Orleans.

Students in Pre-K -7 who submit a Round 2 application and receive a place will lose their Main Round placement and/or seat at their current school. ###
