Freedom Ain't Free—The 1960s, A Pivotal Era in History

February once again culminated with our Annual Black History Program. The production was written and directed by 4th grade teacher Ms. R. Robinson. This is Ms. Robinson's second time at the helm of the yearly program.

This year's production told the story of the mid 20th century Civil Rights Movement—The 1960s, A Pivotal Era in History. The production brought us back to the '60s through the musical icons of Aretha Franklin, Sam & Dave, and James Brown. 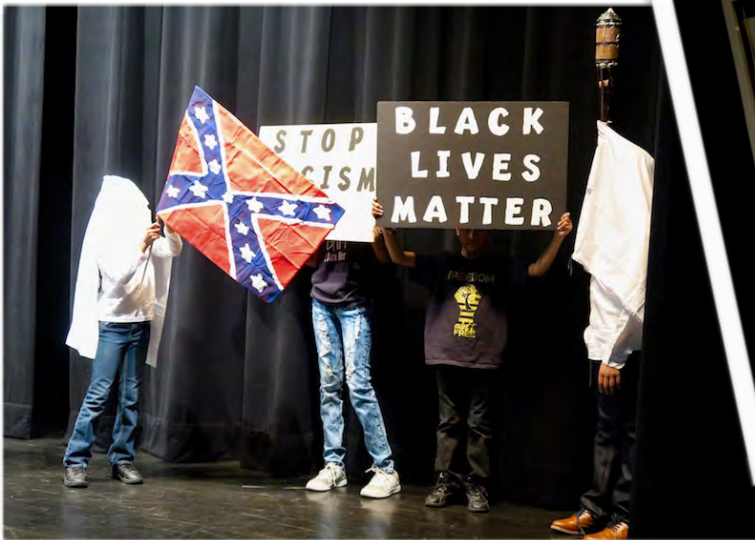

Principal's Message

March 12, 2018

Dear Parents,

On today, I had to send out a letter to parents regarding an incident at our school that deeply troubled me. In case you did not receive your copy, it contained the following message . . .

"Dear Fannie Family,

I wanted to make you aware of an incident that took place around noon today. A student at Fannie C. Williams made a violent threat. Immediate action was taken and the local authorities were contacted. No one was in immediate danger and classes were not interrupted.

Please use this opportunity to remind your child that all threats have to be taken seriously and should not occur at ALL.

We understand that students may not mean the words they say, but we are required by law to report all threats.

If you have any questions or concerns, please contact me.

This offers the opportune time to stress to your children the importance of being mindful of what they say—verbally and electronically on social media. Students should be aware that social media—Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, Twitter, YouTube, etc. is monitored by law enforcement. 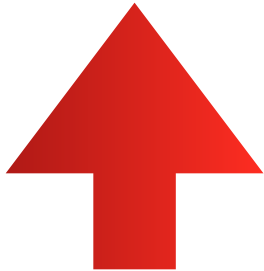

Fannie Cornelia Williams

(March 23, 1882 - June 12, 1980)

"Our school's namesake was a trailblazer, humanitarian,
civic leader, and the ultimate educator," so states the
cover story for the March 2016 issue of the Warrior
News.

Every so often we like to revisit Miss Williams and her
legacy so that all can be made aware of her pioneering
efforts to education for African American children in
New Orleans Public Schools.

Let's look at highlights from her life:

- Fannie C. Williams was born in Biloxi, MS on March 23, 1882. She was one of seven children;
- She came to New Orleans to attend high school at the teacher prep program of Straight University (now DU);
- She began teaching on the Gulf Coast and eventually returned to New Orleans and was assigned to Fisk Elementary;
- In 1912 she transferred to the Miro School at the request of the principal Hattie V. Feger;
- She became the interm principal and the school's name was changed to Valena C. Jones during her tenure;
- She earned a B.A. degree and a Bachelors of Pedagogy from Michigan State Normal School (later Eastern Michigan University) in 1920;
- She became the principal of Jones School in April of '21;
- She was a pioneer in education, putting unique programs into place for the children of Jones School in the 7th Ward. Jones School had a kindergarten program, nursery classes, annual health day, the first African American Girl School Troop (Troop 99) in the city, parenting classes, quality testing with —*con't in next column*

help from NOPS, she motivated students to eat healthy, she encouraged field trips off campus—Baton Rouge, Tuskegee, the Gulf Coast, and Audubon Park. Remember, Miss Williams were advocating for her kids when Jim Crow Laws were being enforced in the South;

- She retired in 1954 from Jones School but continued her work with disabled children, adult reading classes and with teaching Hispanics to read and write English;
- She also volunteered in an adult education program sponsored by the Council of Jewish Women;
- Miss Williams loved to travel, seeing Mexico, Europe and parts of the United States;
- She won several awards for the American Teachers' Association (ATA) and the National Teachers' Association (NTA);
- U.S. Presidents Hoover, Roosevelt, and Truman requested her counsel in matters regarding the black community;
- Dillard University (DU) opened a female dormitory bearing her name on their Gentilly Blvd. campus in 1946;
- Miss Williams served on the Board of Directors for Dillard Univ. & Flint-Goodridge Hospital;
- She died on June 12, 1980, at the age of 98;
- One of the state's largest middle schools was named in her honor on the site we presently reside. Built between 1987-89, FCW Middle School had at one time more than 1200 students;
- Her legacy lives on today as Fannie C. Williams Charter School. ###

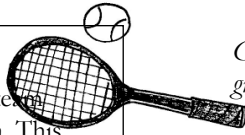

Rowdy Behavior on Bus Can Cause You to Lose Your Ride

Dean Sisco has informed the **WN** that she is concerned about an uptick in behavioral issues on the school bus.

Students and parents are reminded that students who do not follow all rules and regulations regarding behavior on the school bus will be subjected to losing their ride to and from school. It then becomes the parent's obligations to drop and pick up their child from school. Loss of bus privileges can range from mandatory parental conferences, to one day suspension, or dismissal from the bus for the rest of the school year. **Riders and their parents are reminded that the bus service is a privilege and not a right.**

The driver is responsible for the safe transportation of all students. Students who misbehave on the bus are a distraction for the driver. Bus drivers are adults and should always be respected. The driver will notify Dean

Sisco of behavior incidents. The school will act on behalf of the safety and well-being of all aboard.

Parents who have concerns should not confront the bus driver. Allow Dean Sisco or Wells Transportation the opportunity to investigate. Report your concerns to them immediately. Do not approach the driver.

Students and parents signed a Warrior Way Contract stating that they understood all the rules and regulations regarding the school bus. Please review that document (*Family Handbook, pg. 13 or the school's website electronic copy*) and make sure your child understands the consequences of their actions on the school bus.

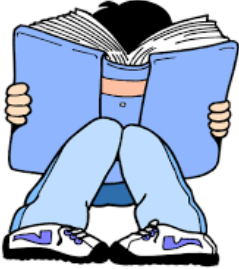
