Dear Warrior Parents/Guardians,

Several weeks ago, we sent home a letter regarding two students at FCWCS who had contracted the mumps. Both of these students had been vaccinated, but still they caught this childhood disease. It is possible to still get the mumps, even if you've been vaccinated. This is especially true if you've had close contact with someone who had the disease. Their bout with it was less severe because of the vaccination.

According to the experts, the vaccine is long-lasting and effective 99% of the time. There are two doses of the vaccine that should be administered to children (known as the MMR vaccine—measles, mumps, and rubella). The first dose at 12 to 15 months of age and

the second dose at 4-6 years of age. Teens and adults should also be up to date on the MMR vaccination.

Making sure all student shot records are up-to-date is one of my major responsibilities as the school nurse. Please make sure your child has had all the necessary vaccinations for their age group. Diseases like the mumps, measles, chickenpox, etc. are easily spread in a school setting. My job is to keep everyone healthy.

Now is also a good time to get your family ready for flu season. Late October is usually when we began to see students fall ill to this respiratory illness. The flu can be a serious disease that can lead to hospitalization or even death in the very young and the elderly. The CDC (Center for Disease Control) says that 80,000 people died from the flu last year. In any given year, 5% to 20% of the population will get the flu. You still have a small chance to get the flu even with being immunized. But the illness will probably not be as severe. It is certainly worth the effort. See your doctor soon. ###

Are you teaching your child life-long economic lessons like saving money?

FCWCS & Hancock Whitney Bank Partners in Bank at School Program

Help your scholar develop good money skills early by enrolling them in the Bank at School Program (in conjunction with Hancock Whitney Bank). An application needs to be completed with personal information for both the custodial parent and the minor's (student's) information for participants. **The account remains free of service charges until your child turns 18.**

Parents wishing to enroll now, who missed the original signing can find the paperwork at the Hancock Whitney Branch at 5775 Read Blvd. (70127) or at FCWCS with Mrs. B. Watson, our school's finance director. A minimum deposit of \$5.00 is needed to open an account.

Once a month, representatives from Whitney's Read branch will come to FCWCS to accept student's deposits, presented by the students themselves. They are instructed how to fill out a deposit slip and count money. **Cash deposits will be limited to \$25.00 and coin deposits \$10.00. Checks can be of any amount.**

We've already had one visit (at press time). It was a fantastic experience for those students receiving their savings register!

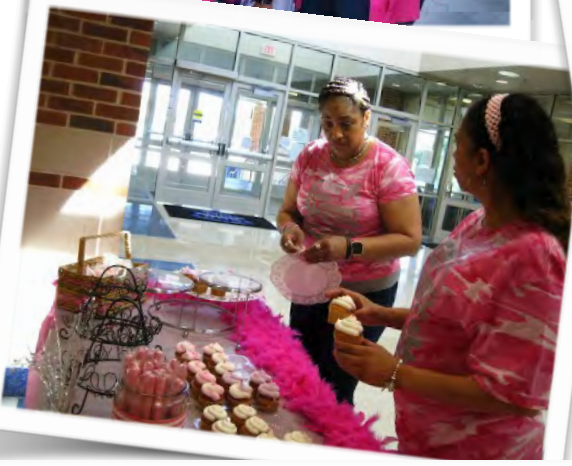

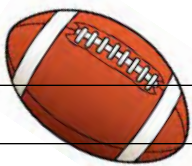


Cup Cake Social & Warrior Bucks–Wednesday, October 17

1st Quarter Grades Issued

Parents should have received their child's 1st quarter (9 weeks) grades by now.

Please carefully review and note your child's progress or need to improve. Pupils who did not receive their report card were given a Request for Conference by their teacher.

All students who are participants in our athletic program and organizations (such as the band and marching units) **are reminded that they must meet Academic Requirements and Behavior Requirements to participate.**

Participants must maintain a **2.0 GPA** to be eligible for participation in any athletic team or marching unit group. If grades fall below the 2.0 GPA after the first quarter or any subsequent quarter, the student will be placed on academic probation. The student then has the opportunity to bring their GPA up to the required 2.0 for continued participation.

Students can also be removed because of behavior problems. Deans Sisco and Daigle and the Family Handbook can advise parents of these requirements.

Failure to meet the requirements will result in removal from the extra-curricular activity for the remainder of the school year (*See Family Handbook for additional information*).

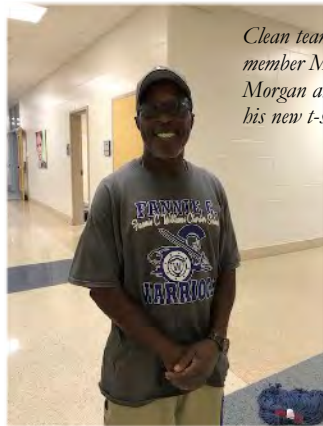

From Our Archives—Six Years Ago This Month

FCWCS Moves Into New Facility

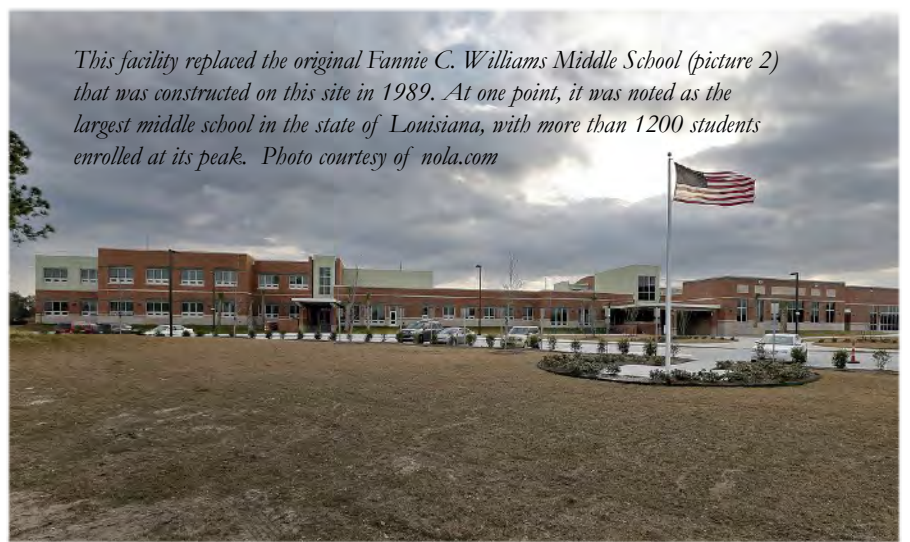
Six years ago this month, we made the trek from the rear of our 16 acre campus to the front acres facing Bullard.

It was October 2012 and we moved into our new “home,” a \$24,000,000 school building purchased with funding from FEMA. On Friday, October 12th, there was no school for students. The day before, 550 students and teachers assisted in the move, removing small items from the trailers. We carried books, bulletin boards and rode tricycles (ridden by Pre-K and K students) across the acres. Everything from the trailers to our new state-of-the-art building had to be moved. Furniture and heavy objects were brought over by a moving company composed of men.

Fall Break in 2012 (October 15-19) coincided with moving week. One week of no school for students to get everything set up in the new facility. On Friday, October 19th, we had Tour Day/Open House. After five years in the FEMA trailers, we were definitely excited about our new digs! Our first day in the new building was Monday, October 22nd.

Fannie C. Williams Charter was one of six new school buildings that went up after FEMA awarded the city nearly \$2 billion to rebuild all of its public schools after Hurricane Katrina and the flooding that followed. Yeates & Yeates Architects were the design team. Construction began in December 2010, just as we were granted our charter.

We felt (and still do) that our scholars deserve to be educated in a building such as this—with all the “bells and whistles” for teaching and learning in the 21st century. The 95,000 ft. building was dedicated on November 15, 2012. ###



This facility replaced the original Fannie C. Williams Middle School (picture 2) that was constructed on this site in 1989. At one point, it was noted as the largest middle school in the state of Louisiana, with more than 1200 students enrolled at its peak. Photo courtesy of nola.com



The original Fannie C. Williams School was a middle school, housing grades 6-8. Built in 1987-89, it was reportedly the largest middle school in Louisiana, educating more than 1200 students. It is pictured above, months after the levee failures of 2005. It was completely demolished to build the present FCWCS. FCWCS was one of the first six schools in NOLA erected to restart public education in New Orleans.

one is sure if lead is
present, but after the crisis
in Flint, MI it was thought
to be the best solution. The
school's kitchen faucets will
also be outfitted with the
