What is a Chromebook? A Chromebook is an affordable laptop computer that has become an essential tool for schools in this era of distant learning. It uses the Chrome Operating System.

What an undertaking, providing more than 500 students with Chromebooks so that they could access their distant learning instruction in the Spring of 2020.

Our Technology Coordinator, Carla Lewis, was able to secure enough devices and hotspots so that students could finish the 4th quarter of 2019-2020. That proved gratuitous, because Chromebooks became the in demand devices all over the Metro area.

Our school now has 1:1 access of Chromebooks for our students. That means every student enrolled has their own personal device. Please help your child to understand the importance of keeping their device clean and in good working order.

On the top of this page is a list illustrating the cost of repairing or replacing the Chromebook. It is important that we keep the Chromebooks in good working order. We need them!

October 16, 2020 Dear Parents/Guardians

We are into our 2nd Quarter of learning, 1/4 of the year has flown by. I have a few items that I would like to mention to you. They are as follows:

- 1. Car riders should not leave your car until a staff member takes their temperature (see pg. 3 of this newsletter).
- 2. We cannot have kids entering the building before 7:30 am. Staff arrives at 7:20 am.
- 3. **Dismissal begins at 2:45 pm**. Please be prompt to pick your child up here or at the bus stop.
- 4. Impress upon your child the importance of the mask, clean hands, and social distancing.
- 5. Chromebooks are important tools for learning on campus and especially at home, keep them in good working condition. Avoid having students drinking and eating while using them. They are not toys.
- 6. It is important to get the flu shot this year. COVID-19 and the flu have many of the same symptoms. Eliminate all guess work of what your illness may be.
- 7. **Keep abreast of what's happening** by reading the **WN**, accessing the website (fcwcs.org), reading Class DoJo, taking part in school surveys. Thanks for entrusting your child(ren) with us.



October 16, 2020 Dear Parents/Guardians

There are a few things we need to advise you of in dealing with COVID-19 and kids attending school.

- 1. Sick children cannot come to school.
- 2. Be on the lookout for COVID-19 symptoms. They include, but are not limited to:
 - fever greater of 100.4 F
 - shortness of breath
 - chest pain
 - dry cough
 - body aches
 - diarrhea, nausea
 - · loss of taste/smell
 - other flu or cold like symptoms.

Seek medical attention immediately. In case of emergency, dial 9-1-1.

3. Close contacts will be notified immediately with instructions on how to proceed. Next steps are evaluated on a case by case basis.

4. Symptoms for children may appear as the following:

- •fever
- •fatigue
- •headache
- •myalgia (muscle pain)
- •cough
- •nasal congestion or running nose
- •shortness breath or difficult in breathing

poor appetite or poor tasting

- •abdominal pain
- •diarrhea
- •nausea or vomiting
- Students who do not show these symptoms but have been in close contact (within 6 feet of someone for a total of 15 minutes or more) with a person with lab confirmed COVID or probable infection must remain

home for 10 days. There will be no academic penalties for missing days. You will need to communicate information to the school staff regarding the missed days (talk to us **before** sending your child to school).

5. NOTICE these symptoms mirror the annual FLU! How will you know the difference? Flu shots are very important

this year! The State of Louisiana will provide them to us on November 18.

They will be offered to our staff (insurance card needed) and to students (with or without insurance). Parental consent will be needed. I will send the necessary information to you at a later date.

6. Please remember to continue all immunizations and well-child care.

Healthcare workers will work with you to keep children up to date with all recommended vaccinations, especially with influenza (flu) vaccination for the 2020-2021 season (see #5).

7. Parents, don't forget yourself!

Mammograms, Pap Smears, your flu shots, A1C checkups, etc. should all continue, even during a pandemic.

Did you know public water fountains (like those at schools) have been turned off during the global pandemic?

Please send your scholar to school with a bottle or two of water each day. If more is needed, we have a limited supply on hand.

Every person—adults and students— must wear a mask while in the building. We are following the protocols as set by the Center for Disease Control to combat COVID-19. Before your child leaves home each morning, make sure they have their mask!





Parents of car riders are asked to wait with your child in the car if you arrive before 7:30 am. Faculty is scheduled to arrive at 7:20 am and need time to get into place before kids enter the building. Remember, staff will come to your car to take your child's temperature. We appreciate you not sending sick kids to school. We're working hard to keep all

FYI (for your information) . . .

What body temperature will warrant a student or adult's removal from school?

Any student or adult entering the building must have their temperature taken. Anyone having a temperature of 100.4° will not be allowed on campus.

Employees will return home. Car riders will return home with their parents (that's why their temps are taken before their parents leave the campus).

Bus riders temps are taken upon entering the building. If the temperature is 100.4° or greater, they are escorted to the isolation room and the temperature is retaken in 30 minutes with another type of device. They will be asked if they have been in contact with anyone who has had a fever, were coughing, etc., (hopefully, the answer will be no). If it is still elevated, parents will be notified and -3-

they will have to come and pick them up immediately. Students will have to remain home until the fever subsides.

These are trying times for all of us!







Sometimes it takes everybody to get students into class on time. Principal Batiste on "thermometer duty" (right).


