

Breast Cancer Awareness Month Did it appear that everyone was wearing pink last month? It was no coincidence. October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. The first known use of a pink ribbon in connection with breast cancer awareness was in the fall of 1991.

I am sending this out as a reminder, to all members of our educational community, to get their mammogram scheduled and done for this calendar year. Prevention is the key to keeping you breast cancer free.

Also guys, remember breast cancer can occur in men. Be aware of any changes that may occur in your chest region. In 2019, it was estimated 286,600 new cases of breast cancer would be found in women. Men were estimated to be 2,470 cases of breast cancer cases.

Early detection, better screening, increased awareness, and new treatment options has caused the cancer deaths to decline in the last 30 years.

Get your mammogram to find breast cancer early when treatment is easy to treat. Encourage all women 40 and over to take



Flu Shot, Have You Taken It Yet?

It is flu season in New Orleans (October through May). Your local pharmacy or doctor's office have are ready to give you that 'shot in the arm' to keep you flu free this year. **The flu was practically invisible last year. Doctors don't believe we will be that lucky this year. Health providers are concerned about fighting COVID and the flu simultaneously.**

Who can get a flu shot?

Everyone 6 months and older should get the flu vaccine every season. Pregnant women can get the flu shot--their unborn child depends on them for protection.

Be sure you get the vaccine that is appropriate for your age and health status. Flu can be especially dangerous for children, causing complications that can result in serious lifethreatening illness.

Adults 65 years and older and younger folks with chronic health conditions (e.g., asthma, heart disease, stroke, diabetes, and chronic kidney disease) should talk to their health care provider to determine what is best for them and their family.

November is Diabetes Awareness Month

Diabetes mellitus refers to a group of diseases that affect how your body uses blood sugar (glucose).

Glucose is important to your health because it is one of the main sources of energy for the cells that make up your muscles and tissues. It also provides the brain its main source of fuel (*Source: mayoclinic.org*).

What are the symptoms of diabetes? Symptoms can vary, depending upon how much sugar is in your blood. This is especially true of prediabetes or type 2 diabetes. In type 1, symptoms are much more extreme.

In type 1 and 2 diabetes, the following symptoms may be present:

- Increased thirst
- Frequent urination
- Excessive hunger
- Unexplained weight loss
- Fatigue
- Irritability
- Blurred vision
- Sores that won't heal quickly
- Frequent infections (e.g., gums, skin, or vaginal)
- Ketones in the urine (byproduct of the breakdown of muscle and fat that happens when there's not enough insulin available in the body)

Type 2 diabetes is the more common than Type 1. Type 2 diabetes can develop at any time but is more common in people older than 40. Type 1 is often called childhood diabetes, but can appear at any age– childhood, adolescence, or adulthood.

The Black and Hispanic communities have the greatest number of individuals with Type 2 diabetes in the USA. If you suspect you or a family member may have diabetes, see your family doctor for the simple blood test needed to confirm or refute your concerns. The sooner you know, the quicker you can alter your lifestyle to control this controllable disease. ####





It is strongly suggested you write your login/username and password down and keep it in a secure it in a place to access it if you should forget this information. FCWCS does not have access to your password;
- 5. You will be asked to answer 2 "secret questions" to help you get into the SPC if you forget your login and password. Good idea to write these down also;
- 6. Click SUBMIT when done. ###

Families have 12 weeks to apply. Once the Main Round period closes, matches will begin. All 76 NOLA-PS affiliated schools are now linked to this program. Parents/guardians will need to complete a two page document and supply proof of residency (2) for Orleans Parish.




