



Successful Students Have Great Attendance!

The State of Louisiana mandates 167 days that students MUST be in attendance. More than 10 days absent can result in students having to repeat the grade. Under Louisiana law, students must attend school from age 7 to 18 *or* until they graduate from high school.

According to the website the <u>classroom.com</u>, "Regular school attendance is crucial to the development and education of children. There is a large impact on the student, the school and the community when a student does not attend school regularly. Because of this impact, in most states there are laws requiring a child to attend school until he/she is eighteen."



March is National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month

The second most common type of cancer in the USA is colorectal. Over 100,000 new cases are diagnosed each year 'colon cancer' is a big problem in our country.

Colorectal cancer can occur in the young—teenagers for example. But the most cases of this cancer is in those 50 and older. The average age for men of diagnosis is 68, women 72. Rectal cancer is 63 for both sexes. 20%-30% of colorectal cancer patients have a family history of the disease. Early detection of this disease is the key.

What are the **risk factors** for colorectal cancer or colorectal polyps (small growth)?

- A diet low in fruit and vegetables.
- Lack of regular physical activity.
- Overweight and obesity.
- · Alcohol and tobacco use.
- A low-fiber and high-fat diet, or a diet high in processed meats (fried foods, red meat—beef, pork, processed meat such as bacon, lunch meats, hot dogs, sausage).

Why is it so common in North America? Simply put, in countries like the USA, people do not move around as much as people in the past. We are sedentary, overweight, thus making us more likely to have diabetes, heart disease, and cancer. Excess weight around the middle (waist line), increases the risk for colon cancer.

How do we **screen (test)** for colorectal cancer?

The procedure is known as a colonoscopy. More than 16.6 million colonoscopies are performed yearly in the USA. The preparation for this procedure in the past is different today. It is not as complicated as it was in the past.

Regular screening should begin at age 45. It should continue until age 75. Those older than 75, should ask their doctor if they should continue the testing.

How do they find colon cancer in patients younger than 45?

We usually think of this cancer as one affecting older adults. But anyone who has rectal bleeding, abdominal pain, weight loss and anemia at any age should be check out. Source: cancer.org, cancer.net, hofmhealth.org, cdc.gov



Who's in the Classroom?

Faculty Members to Know

This column is the tenth in a series about the educators who teach and supply support services at FCWCS.

Maryellen Kelly 4th/5th Grade Mathematics Teacher

Finding good math teachers seems to be a never ending task for school administrators these days. Well, we are blessed to have Mrs. Maryellen Kelly, a lady with a penchant for black and white clothing and on point teaching. She's on board at Fannie, a gifted mathematics educator, and we're ecstatic to have her!

Stop by her classroom and she is usually at the smart board, skillfully illustrating a lesson. You will notice engaged students, following every mark she writes on that board. Once she leaves the board, she circulates around the room, checking on the progress of her students as they work their way through problems on their own. Always persuading them to figure the problem out to the end, she is a great motivator. Her knowledge of her subject matter is apparent.

Kelly has been an educator for 34 years, with about six of those years at FCW instructing 4th and/or 5th graders. Born in New Orleans, she attended Francis T. Nicholls High (now Frederick Douglass), graduating an entire year early. As a student, she was a member of the school's choir (alto) and was active on the "Dancing Bobcats" squad.

Post-secondary education took place at Southern University (Bachelor's). In 2005, she earned a Master's at the University of New Orleans. Why did she become a teacher? Her inspiration was derived from her mother, "one of the greatest educators I know," states Kelly. A love for teaching and learning serves her well. Her teaching does not end on Fridays, it continues on Sunday, where she teaches The Women's Sunday School class at her church. She is the Praise Leader for the women's ministry and she works very closely with two women shelters in the city.

Her best qualities? She believes them to be "a love for teaching and learning, a love for God and his people, and a passion for forgiving." All three will definitely serve you well as an educator. Special talents or hobbies of Mrs. Kelly are seamstress, singing, orator, and theologian. She's been involved in the church her entire life, "before I knew myself." At the age of five, she sang her first solo and at nine she delivered her first first message in front of the congregation.

Family life includes a marriage of 40 years, three daughters, and three granddaughters, stability in an age where education is constantly changing. When Kelly began her teaching degree three decades ago, mathematics education was very different. Common core and the standards-based mathematical instruction has caused veteran teachers to learn the "how to" all over again. All great teachers are life-long learners. Mrs. Kelly keeps up with the latest methods of teaching. Check out the bulletin board outside her class (*last picture on right*). A definite nod to STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math), something that has been around since the 19th century, but in recent decades has taken the forefront of a combined curriculum among the stated disciplines.







It's Spring-Testing Season Th

School days are always filled with tests—weekly, quarterly, semester, and state standardized tests. It's always been that way, it's how teachers know their students are mastering the subject matter.

The week of March 7th, our ESL (English as a second language students) started the ball rolling with the ELPT (English Language Proficiency Test). This assessment assesses the Englishlanguage proficiency of students who meet the participation criteria for Els as they progress through school.

FCWCS has a Latino population (12.6%) in need of additional services. We have one teacher and one paraprofessional (Terrasina Bowden and Corina Guerrero, respectively) who handle the Spanish instructional and communication needs of our Latino families.

All students identified as ELs (English Language students) are required to take the ELPT. A survey sent home determines who is eligible for the test (see <u>lousianabelieves.com</u> for additional information).





Did you know . . .

Our school's namesake, Fannie Cornelia Williams, was born on March 23, 1882 in Biloxi, MS?

She left Biloxi to further her education in New Orleans, where the opportunities were better for African Americans. In 1904, she graduated from Straight College, a school that later merged with New Orleans University to form Dillard University.


From 1904 to 1908, her first job teaching was in Gulfport and Pass Christian, Mississippi. She had returned home to assist with her ailing mother. In 1920, she received two degrees (a Bachelor of Arts and a Bachelor of Pedagogy). from Michigan State College.

Returning to New Orleans in 1921, Williams taught at Valena C. Jones Normal School, established in the 7th Ward to educate children and teachers (thus the Normal in its name). She was instrumental in having nursery (called Pre-K today) and kindergarten classes for black children in the city's public school system, a very unique curriculum for a black institution at that time. She is also credited with creating a yearly child health day, when medical professionals from Flint-Goodridge Hospital/Dillard University visited schools and performed services free of charge. Jones School was the home of the first black Girl Scout Troop (Troop #99) in the City of New Orleans.

Whenever anyone visited New Orleans and wanted to visit a "Negro" school, they visited Valena C. Jones with its huge student population, outstanding faculty, and exceptional principal, Fannie Cornelia Williams. She was a participant in three White House conferences on education during the administrations of

Herbert Hoover, Franklin Roosevelt, and Harry Truman.

She retired from Jones School in 1954. In the late 1980s, New Orleans Public Schools established Fannie C. Williams Middle School on Dwyer Road in her honor. It was destroyed during the floods of 2005. Today, FCWCS sits on the 16-acres that once housed that school.

Did you know . . .

New Orleans Public Schools is seeking a new superintendent for the 2022-2023 school year? Dr. Henderson Lewis, Jr. will be stepping down at the end of the current academic year.

Dr. Henderson took the helm on March 18, 2015, as one of the youngest superintendents ever in the 180-year history of our school system. He arrived on board with almost 25 years as a teacher, instructional coach, curriculum

expert, principal, mentor and school board member for the parish of St. Bernard.





Did you know . . .

FCW Elementary School was established during the 2007-2008 school year on the site of the former Fannie C. Williams Middle School on Dwyer Road in New Orleans?

It was opened as a Recovery School District school, with open enrollment for families returning to the city's eastern area after the storms and flooding of 2005. We served Pre-K through 6th grades

during our first year. A 7th grade was added in 2008-2009. Eighth grade completed our academic configuration the next year.

Our 95,000 sq. ft. building, cost about \$24,000,000 to construct. It sits on 16 acres of land along the Bullard Avenue corridor. We moved in October 2012. The building was formally dedicated on November 15, 2012.




