Dear Parents/Guardians

It's April already and we're in the 4th quarter of our academic year!

Attendance and punctuality continues to be a concern. Students must be present and on time each day to achieve mastery of their classes. Each morning, we have scores of students arriving tardy—often missing most of their first class. **Breakfast is served at 7:30 am, instruction begins at 8:00 am.** Remember, one day these scholars will become adults and employees. How long will they keep their careers going if they are can't arrive on time?

As you know, the mask mandate has been lifted by the district. Whether your child continues to wear their mask is your decision. Please advise them of your preference. Masks are still available for as long as the supply lasts. Once the supply is exhausted, you will have to supply your child's mask. Remember, all children, five and older, are eligible for immunization.

Testing will begin soon for students in grades 3-8. It is imperative that they are here on time, ready to go! LEAP testing will take place on our campus for grades 6-8 the

week of April 25th, followed by grades 3-5 the week of May 2nd. All electronic devices are banned from school these weeks. These devices can cause the entire class's tests to be voided. The State will be monitoring our testing.

Smart watches are not to be worn to school the entire week. Phones will be collected (as usual) before testing begins and book bags should be left at home.

Main Round for NCAP Results Released

Class of 2026 High School Decisions Revealed

On March 30th, New Orleans Public Schools (NOLA-PS) released the New Orleans Common Application placement results for next year.

NCAP is the centralized school enrollment process (formerly known as OneApp) for Orleans Parish public schools.

Forty (40) of our 8th graders took part in this main round and received their notifications for next year. According to NCAP, 94% of 9th grade applicants received placement that was number one on their list and 90% received one of their top three choices.



Masks are optional in New Orleans Public Schools, March 21st

NOLA-PS has done away with the rule requiring students and school staff to wear masks to school. Monday, March 21st marked the first day since the pandemic began that masks are not a requirement. This decision was made as the COVID-19 positivity rate continues to keep at a steady low (below 1%).

The city of New Orleans dropped the requirement two weeks ago. For the first time in more than two years, entire faces can be seen. Remember, lower elementary scholars on campus have never attended school without masks!

Please remember to have your child vaccinated to protect them and others who are susceptible to the virus (the elderly, those with immunity issues and little ones who can't be vaccinated). Vaccinations are usually FREE and can be found at any Walgreens and CVS Pharmacy. Don't forget to keep up with those vaccination cards.

51 Vaccinations administered, March 16th

Thanks to all parents/guardians who gave permission for their child to receive their vaccinations. Health Heroes (in connection with Children's Hospital), gave the shots to 59 students and 3 staff members.

9 Immunizations given, March 17th

Childhood immunizations for diseases like measles, chicken pox, diphtheria, etc. are still needed to keep children safe. Parents are encouraged to keep up with their child's shot requirements. Part of my responsibilities is to ensure all childhood immunizations are up-to-date. Notices will be sent home for students who are in need of immunizations (vaccinations).

April is National Alcohol Awareness Month

Every April since 1987, the National Council on Alcohol and Drug Dependence, Inc. (NCADD) has sponsored Alcohol Awareness to make the public aware of the health hazards of excessive drinking.

The last two years has resulted in more individuals using alcohol to cope with life during a pandemic. Children may have witnessed an increase in parental/guardian drinking due to family life centering around the home.

Think about it, does your social activities center around excessive amounts of alcohol? Sports, a night out on the town, dinner at a restaurant, a crawfish boil in the backyard, a birthday celebration—do these activities center around the company or the liquor? Done in moderation, no problem, but excessive drinking harms your health (physically and mentally) and sends the wrong message to (cont'd on pg. 4)

Alcohol Awareness . . . children who are watching. Young people will usually model the behaviors of the adults around them. What message are you sending?

National figures indicate a drop in the number of young people who use alcohol, but it remains the number one drug for America's youth. Youngsters are more likely to succumb to alcohol than all the illegal drugs combined. That's why it is important to make the public aware and educate people about alcoholism and the treatments available. Parents should start talking to their child(ren) about the dangers of excessive and underage drinking as early as 9 years of age. The brain of a pre-teen/ teen is quite different from an adult. The teen brain continues to develop well into their '20s. Drinking has negative impacts on this development. That is why drinking under the age of 21 is illegal.

Do you have alcohol in your home? It should be under lock and key, just as you would a gun. It is not unheard of young people partaking of liquor without their parent's knowledge.

We are aware of binge drinking on college campuses, but a taste for alcohol can develop as early as middle school. We will soon be in the midst of prom season. Cars and underage drinking can be lethal.

How can you tell they may already be drinking?

- 1. Look for behavior changes;
- 2. Mood and personality has become different;
- 3. Poor hygiene;
- 4. Health issues (slurred speech, frequently ill, excessive weight loss or gain; vomiting, seizures, accidents or unusual injuries;
- School work is suffering (complaints from teachers or deans, loss of interest in extracurricular activities).

Here's a few ideas to avoid the above . . .

- Set a healthy example.
 Model the behavior you want your child to imitate.
- 2. Make sure you monitor children and their access to alcohol at home and outside the home (know their friends). Keep your liquor out of easy access.
- 3. Make your child aware of your expectations and that you always have an open door policy to talk.

Reach out to experts if you need help. Our counseling staff can help with suggestions. ###

Who's in the Classroom?

Faculty Members to Know

This column is the 11th in a series about the educators who teach and supply support services at FCWCS.

Terry Green Physical Education Teacher & Coach

If you've followed FCWCS athletics the last decade or so, you have got to know Coach Green. He's the guy with the baseball hat on (usually) backwards and dressed in athletic attire. He's also the coach who has steered the Warriors to five championships in flag football and one championship in basketball.

Terry Green was born in New Orleans ("Charity Hospital," according to Green). Green grew up in neighboring St. Bernard Parish on the only all black street in Meraux Ville, Walker's Lane. During his teen years, the family moved to Violet, Louisiana. He attended Chalmette High School.

A true sportsman, Coach Green lettered in basketball and football, earning his letters for participating in both sports all four years of high school. He was awarded All-District Honors during his sophomore, junior and senior years in football. All-District morphed into All-State and All-Metro during his 11th and 12th grade years on the gridiron.

After graduation from Chalmette, he attended HBCU Langston University in Oklahoma on a football scholarship. During his time as a Langston Lion, he earned Coca-Cola's All-American (for all major HBCUs) during his both his junior and senior years for his play as the starting strong safety for three years.

He earned a B.A. in Psychology in the Spring of 2001 from LU. He had no aspirations to become a teacher until "my college mentor, Mr. Wallace Foster, invited me to assist in coaching at Frederick Douglass in the Fall of '02." In oder to do this, he had to become a teacher at the the school on St. Claude Avenue. "I found my passion in education that I didn't know existed in me . . ." states Green. At Douglass, Green taught Computer Science for the 2002-2003 school year before moving on to the SPED departments at McDonogh #42 and Live Oak Middle. His next assignment was as a Physical Education teacher at Algiers Tech Academy (ATA).

Green became part of the Fannie Family in 2009, signing on as the 6th grade math teacher beginning in '09. Two years later, he moved into the coaching and Physical Education, where he remains to date. His time here has been rewarding! Just view the plaques in the gym, with flag football being the most plentiful. With 18 years of education under his belt, he still "has an undeniable passion for sports, whether playing or coaching." He is the father of one daughter and the honor of coaching her AAU (Amateur Athletic Union) basketball team, the St. Bernard Sonics for four years. This allowed time to bond with his offspring and create "everlasting memories for myself and my daughter." He also coached a traveling team of 9 and 10 year olds, known as The Game Dogs (2006-2016).

His inspiration for all this activity comes from "my mother who always taught me to be dedicated to anything I do. She along with my six uncles are who molded the charismatic, dedicated, and affable man I am today."

Great job Coach Green. Your dedication to our scholar-athletes is commendable.



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

Alarms are now available for Deaf and Hard of Hearing citizens (consists of a strobe light, vibrating bed/pillow shaker and a traditional audible alarm.
