As this week comes to a close, we are close to the completion of eight weeks of the 2023-2024 school year. As always, I need to emphasize the importance of great attendance and punctuality.

Our students thrive in a structured setting. It is very important that you send them everyday (and on time). FCWCS is always on a quest to find ways to promote a love of reading among our students. Principal Batiste and Librarian LeBlanc have been able to bring **Prime Time Family** to our campus.

Prime Time offers learning programs that were developed to strengthen families and their communities by connecting the humanities (the study of human cultures through literature, philosophy, history). It uses carefully chosen award-winning children books to 'help children learn to share their ideas and think critically about the world around them' (primetimefamily.org).

#### How will Prime Time Family work?

- We have spots for **20 Fannie families** who are interested in this **FREE** program that lasts only six **(6) weeks**, **starting in October**.
- Parent (or grandparent) and child(ren) will attend the program each Wednesday, from 5-6:30 pm.
- Dinner will be served and each family will receive a copy of the week's book to add or build their family's library.
- The carefully chosen book will be read out loud by a storyteller.
- A discussion with open-ended questions about the book will be used to encourage the children to form their own opinions, not to be judgmental, and "to learn that in life

as in literature, there is rarely one 'simple' answer." (primetimefamily).org

This program allows a great opportunity for parent and child bonding while doing something fun and educational. Don't forget, each family will receive a copy of the award-winning book to take home with you!

#### Q: What does a Dean of Students do on the elementary and middle school level?

A: Deans are responsible for supervising students on campus during arrival and departure, lunch, changing classes, recess, and other activities on campus or field trips.

They lead by positive example and communicate their high expectations for both students and their teachers through motivation to reach the desired outcomes. They are responsible for development and administering disciplinary procedures in accordance to school policies and laws (continued on pg. 4).

#### Terry Green Appointed to Upper Dean

Sisco continues as Lower Dean (Pre-K - 5) Terry Green, former Physical Education teacher and flag football coach, has been chosen to serve as the Dean for Middle School (grades

Green has been a member of the FCW Staff since our days in the FEMA trailers. He first arrived on campus in 2009 as a mathematics teacher and SPED teacher. He quickly became an invaluable member of the staff, serving as an athletic coach for flag football and basketball. Green became our Physical Education instructor, pairing with former female instructor Dana Williams. After Williams's departure, Green manned the Physical Education classes alone.

A native of Violet, Louisiana, Green attended Langston University, the only historical black university in Oklahoma. As a student-athlete, Green played on the Lion's football team as a strong safety.

Not wanting to juggle his duties as a Dean with that of a coach, Green is "surrendering his coach's whistle" to new hire Wayne Steward, Fannie's new Physical Education teacher and flag football coach.

The **WN** predicts Green will be a great asset for the Warrior's on the second floor (middle school).

#### What does a Dean of Students do

...? (continued from pg. 3)

A: They receive referrals and hold conferences with students, parents, teachers, etc. They respond and resolve parent, student, and staff concerns and complaints.

Our Deans are responsible for overseeing behavioral interventions, mediations, suspensions, and expulsion hearings.

They encourage staff to maintain classroom management systems that ensure a focus on learning and student success.

Sisco and Green monitor student attendance and provide the leadership to improve attendance of students.

Deans are also part of the school's Leadership Team and serve on discipline, suspension, or expulsion panels as assigned by the principal.

Sisco and Green are teachers of FCW's school culture-the 4Ps (Warriors are prompt, polite, prepared, and productive). They model a school-wide culture of respect and support of all students.

Sisco and Green serve as our connections to parents to encourage their active involvement in supporting the school's policies regarding student behavior, uniform code, homework, etc.





Hello and welcome to a healthy 2023-2024 school year!

I am Nurse Robichaux and my office is here to keep students at their physical best (a sick child can't be productive in the classroom). Parents, please don't send ill children to school. We are not equipped to handle ill children for a full school day and we run the risk of them making others sick.

The last three years of the world-wide medical crisis has caused an up surge in certain childhood illnesses. Cases of measles have surged to a three-year high as children head back to school. This childhood infection is caused by a virus and was once very common. Also known as rubeola, measles spreads easily and can be quite serious and even fatal for small children.

COVID's recent surge, chicken pox, mumps, Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) and the aforementioned mumps, are just a few of the illnesses that can attack students. I hope you took the summer as an opportunity to ensure that your child's immunizations and annual check-up were addressed. Students who don't have current "shots" will not be allowed to attend class.

Let's not forget to have your child immunized against the flu by October. Upper respiratory ailments are always problematic in school-age children. Let's work to keep our Warriors healthy and excelling in the classroom. Healthy children have the first tools needed to be productive.

LEAP 2025 Scores are in and 80+ scholars did an awesome job . . .

#### Warriors Achieve Advanced or Mastery!

Each year, public school students in Louisiana in grades 3 through 12, take state tests to measure their knowledge and skills in each subject area. The test accesses their readiness for the next grade or preparedness for graduation from high school.

The LEAP is just one of several ways schools use to assess students. Report cards, teacher-made tests, classwork, and homework, along with the state's standardized tests are used to get a full picture of a child's achievements.

The Spring '23 scores have been reviewed and FCWCS had 80+ students to reach advanced or mastery level on English Language Arts (ELA), Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies.

There are five performance levels on the state's Louisiana Educational Assessment Program (LEAP). They are:

1) Advance; 2) Mastery; 3) Basic; 4) Approaching Basic and; 5) Unsatisfactory.



#### No One Fights Alone!

In celebration of our student, Mia, we are highlighting the month of September as, "Leukemia Awareness Month."

Mia, and two other members of our school family (one adult and another student), have had to battle leukemia. Leukemia is also known as blood cancer because it usually involves white blood cells. Many types of leukemia exist, some attacking children and others adults.
