Defibrillator**

A defibrillator is a device that is used to give an electric charge or current to the heart to restore a normal heartbeat. If someone is having a heart attack, it can get the heart beating again.

There are different types of defibrillators. This one is an Automated external defibrillator (AED) and are commonly found in public places.

FCWCS was able to purchase this invaluable device by securing a grant through the **Parent Heart Watch** organization. Student Cardiac Arrest (SCA) is the third leading cause of death in the USA. More than 356,000 Americans suffer annually. This number also includes

about 23,000 youth under 18. The PHW reports, "that SCA survival rate has remained at about 10 percent for 30 years because we aren't as prepared as we should be to help save lives."

There are 10 members on staff who have been trained to use the defibrillator if the need should arise. However, we hope to never have to use it! ###

Developing Scholar/Athletes

Building a school from 'scratch' includes staffing, academics, developing a school culture and a mountain of other things—including extra-curricular activities. Sports and music would become hallmarks of our extra-curricular life.

Initially, sports was flag football and volleyball. We added cross country, basketball (girls and boys), and tennis. Flag football, volleyball, and basketball have proven to have staying power.

Why do schools offer sports to the student body? It has proven to be a way to develop a positive culture in the K-12 school. The **4Ps of Fannie (Warriors are prompt, polite, prepared, and productive)** are behaviors the classroom teacher and any coach aspires to develop in their student/athletes.

Athletics is perfect for developing mental and physical well-being. It fosters friendships and positive relationships, while developing well-rounded youngsters. Sports is a team-focused activity centered on improving the player physically and mentally.

Teams will not always be victorious, so players learn to handle adversity as well as success. Athletes learn how to manage their time while balancing their studies. To stay on a team, scholar/athletes must maintain a decent GPA.

Sports aids the school in getting parental support, making it one of the reasons parents often visit school's campuses (*cont'd in next column*).

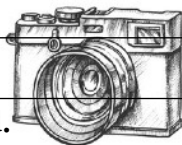

Usually they are here to read to our Pre-K and kindergarten classes. Today (Nov. 30), they came to serenade us with their vocal

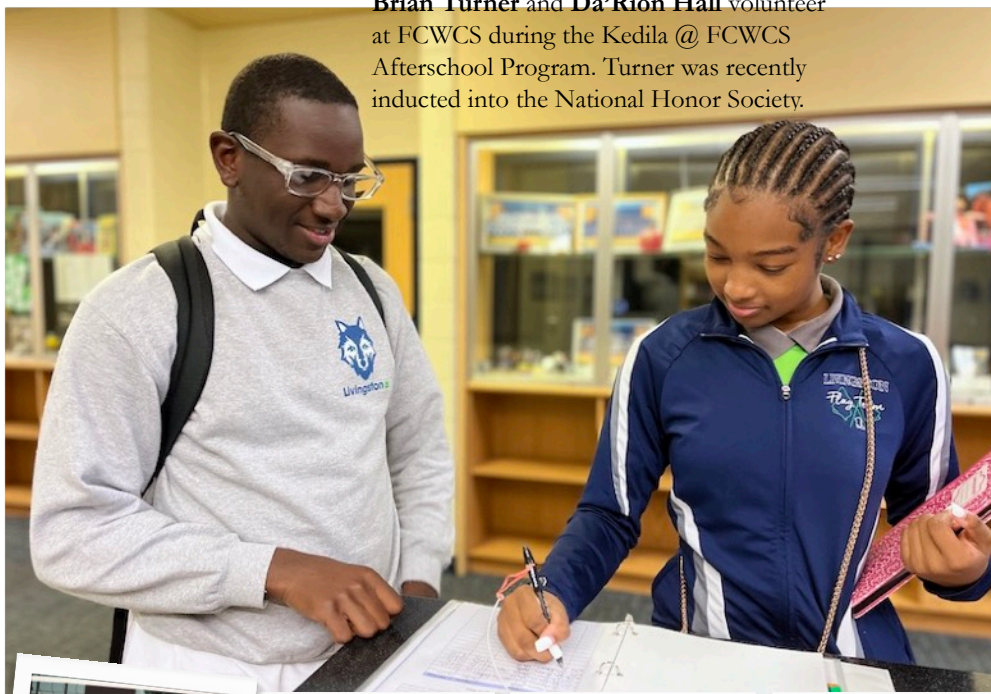


talents! They even got our teachers and paras dancing (above). Go Mrs. Brown! Thank-you Cornerstone Harmonizers.

Making Us Proud, Former Students Excel

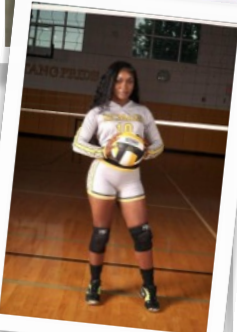

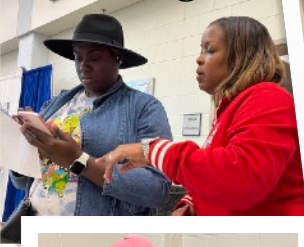

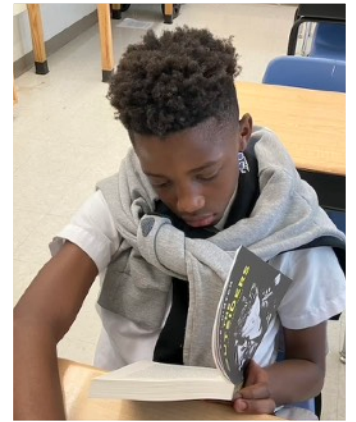

D.E.A.R. (Drop Everything and Read)

On the first Friday in December, Fannie C. began the D.E.A.R. reading initiative.

Promptly at 1:30 pm until 1:45 pm everyone on campus will drop everything and read. Pre-K through 5th grade students will be treated to a story read aloud by the teacher. Middle school students will read independently from a book of their choice.

Reading is THE most important skill that students should learn early in their educational life. It is the foundation for all other subjects. Reading is exercise for the mind, whether you are 5 or 75.

The following are good reasons why children should read daily:

1. Reading improves vocabulary;
2. It improves comprehension;
3. It develops critical thinking skills;
4. Reading improves memory;
5. Readers do better in school;
6. It improves analytical skills;
7. Reading helps to build confidence;
8. Reading helps you socialize by sharing and interacting with others;
9. Reading broadens your horizons;
10. Writing skills are improved;
11. Reading improves focus and concentration;
12. Reading makes you more empathetic;
13. It helps to develop emotions;
14. Readers often are leaders;
15. Books allow you to learn at your own pace.

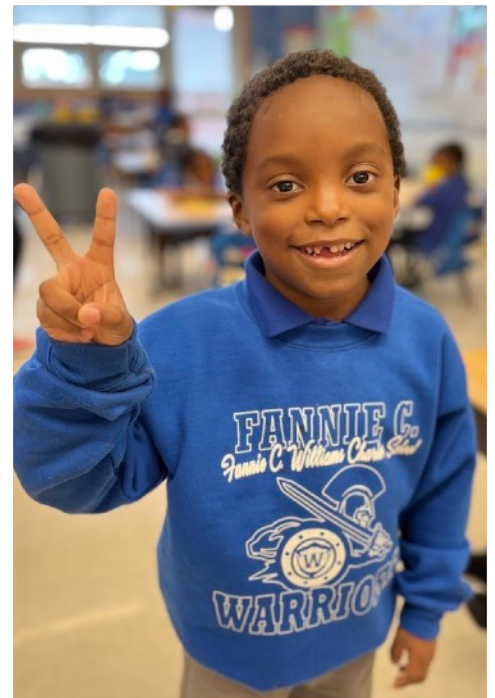
