





Dear Parents & Guardians

We've completed the 1st Quarter of the school year! You've had the opportunity to review your child's first report card. Did they meet your expectations? For the 101 scholars who earned a place on the Warrior Honor Roll, congratulations!

If the grades are not up-to-par, NOW is the time to encourage your child to make adjustments. Students who are enrolled in the Kedila Afterschool Program have a chance to start their homework assignments and seek help if it is needed. **The hour designated for study/ homework may not be enough time to complete the assignments, so parents may have to assist at home.** Do not assume everything is finished when they arrive at home.

School and the home are a partnership–always working together for the betterment of the child. We need your help to encourage your child to do their best. The school nor the home can do what is needed without help from the other.

This past summer, Governor Jeff Landry adjusted the grading scale for students in grades 1-12. The new scale is as follows:

A = 100-90	3.5-4.0
B = 89-80	2.4-3.4
C = 79-70	1.5-2.3
D = 69-60	1.0-1.4
F = 59-0	Below 1.0

General Education students may now receive a grade lower than 60.

The scale has lowered what it takes to get a passing grade. A "D" now ranges from a 69-60. This scale makes it easier to achieve success with effort. However, a "F" is recorded for students not putting forth any effort. It will be harder to 'recover' from. A "F" can range from 59-0. Students will no longer receive a 60. Please inform your scholar of this change in the grading procedure. Encourage them to make every effort to earn a "C" or better. You can keep informed of your child's progress by accessing their grades and attendance in JPAMS, the electronic grade and attendance book of the Student Progress Center at https//services.edgear.net/progress/

Besides earning a passing grade in the class, students must be present a minimum of 156 days out of 166 days in our calendar. The classroom teacher or Ms. Aziz (school social worker) will reach out to you when attendance is becoming problematic. **Students absent 10 days or more may be subject to repeating the grade.**

We hope to see our parents/ guardians come out to discuss their child's progress or needs. This is the best time to meet your their instructors.

# Cold, Flu, and COVID Season

Now is the time for immunizations!

We've had that first cold air to come through New Orleans. Students are back in class and the holidays will be upon us soon. Large inside gatherings necessitates being prepared with up-todate vaccinations.

The Immunization Bus will be on campus the last week in October. They are providing flu and COVID shots. Whenever I can secure them, we offer this opportunity for our students and their families. If you prefer, you can have them vaccinated by your family doctor. No child can be vaccinated if the consent form is not returned as requested.

# Parents of Pre-K students are

reminded that they should have two (2) complete sets of EMERGENCIES clothing (2 shirts, 2 pants, 2 pairs of underwear, and 2 pairs of socks). We will have to call you to come and pick

them up if there are no emergency clothing available. **Parents of Kindergarten students** should provide one (1) complete set of EMERGENCY clothing. This request was made at the beginning of the school year (*see supply lists for Pre-K and kindergarten, fcwcs.org*). No child in 'soiled' clothing can remain in school.

I make every attempt not to call parents to pick children up early. But if I find a child's temperature is high, or they are throwing up, I have no choice but to call you to come and pick them up. A sick child can contaminate an entire class or the school. My job is to keep everyone healthy and ready to learn. Please refer to the Family Handbook on the website, pgs. 7 and 8.

Keep sick children at home. Medical clearance is needed for any student absent five (5) or more days from school. Please have the child bring their doctor's notice when they return. They can turn them into the front office, their homeroom teacher, or my office. ###

# Attendance Counts!

The state requires students must be in attendance 156 of the 166 days. State law mandates the number of days/minutes a student must be in attendance to be promoted to the next grade. **Students who are absent in excess of 10 school days with a permissible excuse may be retained.** 

**Consequences for Unexcused Absences 2-9** •Teacher/School makes attempts to engage families by robo calls and direct calls; •Teacher clearly documents all of their attempts to address attendance issues; •Teacher makes referral to Ms. Aziz, school social worker; •Ms. Aziz makes attempts through phone calls, letter, and./or home visit with family/ guardian; •Ms. Aziz may contact Office of Student Support and Attendance (OSSA) and complete Truancy Check Form; •Ms. Aziz or Attendance Lead at FCWCS may request municipal court summons at 5+ unexcused absences.

# 10+ Days

•Ms. Aziz or School Attendance Lead may submit a Court Summons Request after recommended school level interventions for absenteeism. Each referral is made case by case.

- •Attendance Contract; •Weekly monitoring of attendance;
- •If attendance barriers/ challenges are identified the Summons request may be rescinded. Each is reviewed, case by case. •Schedule attendance conference and/or home visit;
- •Documentation will be kept of all attempts made by FCWCS. ####

# How Much Sleep Does Your Child Need?

How much sleep an individual needs
varies by age. Newborns (0-3 months)
spend most of their days sleeping,
about 6-18 hours. This sleep is
needed for their mental, physical, and
emotional development.

The picture on the right shows one of our Pre-K classes napping. Children of this age (3-5 years) need about 10-13 hours of sleep daily (including their nap 1.5 hr. nap here).

If your child's teacher informs you of their sleepiness in class, maybe they are not getting enough sleep at night. Is there a computer, game console, cell phone in the room of your scholar? Ensure that these devices are off at a decent hour so that they are ready to handle the classroom the next day. Check the list below for appropriate times for your scholar according to their age. Remember, once they are in bed, that gives you opportunity for 'me time'.

Hours Needed for Sleep

According to studies, once puberty hits, it is difficult for teenagers to fall asleep until about 11 pm.

# Bedtime tips for younger ones: 1)

Establish a bedtime routine and stick to it as much as you can; 2) Keep the bedroom dark and quiet; 3) Read, create, and/or listen to bedtime stories.

Wondering how much sleep **you** need? On average, adults need 7-9 hours of sleep. Pregnant women, 8-10 hours. According to the Center of Disease Control, about <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> of Americans don't get enough sleep (at least 7 hours per night).

Not getting enough sleep can lead to serious health problems-heart disease, stroke, diabetes, and mood disorders. ###



Sleep is important in the development of a child. The circadian rhythm is the body's natural way of regulating our day-night cycle. The Pre-K students above are napping in the early afternoon of the school day. According to scientist, they need 10-13 hours per day \*(including the hour nap at Fannie).

It is beneficial to put youngsters on a schedule for sleep, even during the weekends and school holidays. A sleepy child can't be productive in the classroom. They need sleep to grow mentally, physically, and emotionally.

United States Public Health Services Visits Kindergarten Class, Oct. 24 The Importance of Washing Your Hands

Never underestimate the importance of washing your hands to keep from getting sick. We heard this lesson scores of times during the recent COVID-19 pandemic.

Students in Mrs. Vigne's class were taught by the four members of the commissioned corps known as the U.S. Public Health Service. Around since 1889, these medical, health and engineering professionals fight disease, conduct research, and care for patients in underserved communities across America and throughout the world.

Our pupils were taught the importance of washing their hands properly. They were also treated to a great experiment, utilizing a black light to show germs on the many surfaces we touch daily. Great way to teach hand washing! ###




