Dear Warrior Parents/Guardians,

Nurse Cheryl Robichaux here, Fannie's first responder to any medical concerns on campus!

Parents, please notify me in writing regarding any chronic health conditions your child may have (cancer, asthma, diabetes, eczema, food allergies, etc.).

My essential functions are as follows:

- conduct health screenings periodically according to local and state guidelines;
- send notifications to parents of students failing the screening;
- provide basic First Aid to students;
- assess and evaluate ill students during the school day;
- inform parents of possible health concerns so that they may follow-up with a doctor's
- assist in the control of communicable disease with our school family;
- maintain and monitor appropriate health and wellness supplies for campus;
 - maintain up-to-date cumulative health records on all students enrolled; (continued on the next page, column 1)

August 25, 2025 Dear Parents/Guardians,

Welcome to the 2025-2026 school year! Thanks for choosing FCWCS for your scholars.

To ensure a successful school year, we always ask for parental cooperation in observing school policies. A full explanation on 'how we do school can be found' in our Family Handbook on the school's website at fcwcs.org. I am asking that you review it and share with your child(ren) so that everyone is made aware of the dos and don'ts on campus, the school bus and field trips.

All students can learn, but they must be here to do so. Students are expected to come to school everyday and to be on time each morning. Pupils are tardy if they arrive after 8:00 am. Tardy students should be escorted to the office by a parent to receive a tardy pass before he/she can be admitted to class. Scholars must be present 156 days of the 166 days of the school year to be eligible to move on to the next grade. If you need more information regarding the state's attendance law, please contact our Professional School Counselor, Ms. A. Davis at 504.373.6228.

Communications will be distributed primarily via the Wednesday's Warrior Folder, this WARRIOR **NEWS** Newsletter, flyers, student progress reports, the Class Dojo app, and the website. Please check your child's backpack every day (especially Wednesdays) for items that will need your attention. If you are not receiving notices from the school, contact your child's homeroom teacher to help resolve the problem.

This historical marker stands on the grounds of the shuttered Valena C. Jones Elementary School in New Orleans.

The side depicted tells of the importance of the efforts of the community—Rev. Alfred Lawless, Beecher Congregation Church and the Seventh Ward Education League—in 1904 to have a school built for the

children of the 7th Ward. The group raised funds and purchased lots at the corner N. Miro and Annette streets.

Fannie Cornelia Williams (1882-1980) Our school's namesake, Fannie C. Williams, is responsible for many of the educational practices and services we now expect in our schools.

Williams was born in Biloxi, Mississippi, but came to New Orleans to attend high school. There were no high schools open to Blacks during those years in Mississippi. In 1904, she graduated from Straight College with honors (Straight later merged with New Orleans University to form Dillard University). She later pursued two additional degrees from Michigan State University.

Returning to New Orleans in 1921, Williams became the principal of Valena C. Jones Normal School. The school was established to educate the children of the 7th Ward and to train and certify African Americans teachers in New Orleans public schools. She would spend 33 years, until 1954, as the school's principal.

At the dedication of the Jones School's new building, in late October 1929, over 2000 people listened to New Orleans Public School's Superintendent Nicholas Bauer, Dr. Joseph Hardin, and Miss Fannie C. Williams recount the school's earliest days and speak with pride of their new school home-a threestory building with 32 classrooms. Williams hoped the new spacious school would help to stop the spread of contagious diseases that were prevalent in its early days as the Miro School. It quickly became a source of neighborhood pride, providing a quality educational setting for the children of the neighborhood at Annette and N. Miro streets. It was "considered one of the best equipped school buildings in this section of the country."

It was Miss Williams and the parents of Jones School who lobbied the school board to put nursery (now Pre-K) and kindergarten classes in the Valena C. Jones School. We also know that Miss Williams was instrumental in creating an annual child health day, when

medical professionals (doctors, nurses, and dentists) visited the school and performed their services free of charge. These medical personnel were on staff at Flint-Goodridge Hospital, then owned by Dillard University. The hospital was the first black hospital in the South

Our Miss Williams was also responsible for the first African-American Girl Scout Troop (99) in New Orleans. These offerings came to Jones School first and then later to other schools serving black children.

We mention Williams, with pride, in this first issue of the **WN** for 2025-2026 because so many of her innovations still are employed today. Her health fairs and lessons on nutrition inspired parents to raise healthy children. The few discipline problems at Jones School often involved having parents come to the school to handle the problem. Study groups were formed to assist parents in improving their reading and math skills. The school's PTA raised money to finance the projects the school wanted.

We see many parallels to the efforts of Miss Williams and her staff to our mission at today's Fannie C. Williams Charter School. The collaboration between the school and community, the efforts to keep students and staff healthy on campus, scouting for girls and boys, efforts to bring parents to campus for parenting tutoring, visits by esteemed guests, 21st century innovative ways of teaching and reaching kids, awesome extra-curricular activities students, and a great facility.

Let us continue the endeavor to walk in the footsteps of our namesake Fannie C. Williams to raise the next generation of prepared and productive scholars.

Prime Time Family Reading Resumes in October

Prime Time Family Reading program will start up again on Thursday, October 16, 2025.

We extend an invitation to all Warrior families interested in improving literacy and increasing quality family engagement through an innovative storytelling experience.

Parents with scholars in Pre-K through 6 grades are invited to register. It will take place during the weeks of October 16-November 20. The once-a-week sessions are held Thursday evenings from 4:45 pm to 6:30 pm, with dinner being served for students and their parents.

After dinner, a reading of the week's book takes place in the library. The open-ended group discussion that follows allows pupils to discuss the book and hear the point-of-views of their schoolmates.

Each family receives one copy of the night's book to take home to build their family's library. Books are especially chosen for the great stories and lessons they teach. The program encourages reading, develops communication skills, increases text comprehension, and develops critical-thinking abilities.

Prime Time was created by the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities in 1991. The program is designed to engage, educate, and support students and their families.

Look for the registration information in late September. We are hoping you are planning to attend. It's a great way to develop your child into a reader.



Government \$\$\$ Has Been Allocated for 2025-2026

Kedila Afterschool Program Funded

We've finally received word that our monies needed to pay for our awesome after school program has been allocated. We are accepting applications from staff to work the two hour program.

The monies needed for this are provided by federal funding, then funneled through the state to our Kedila. Federal budget cuts caused the later start then we experienced last year. Program coordinator, Karen LeBlanc, is setting

her sights on an October start.

The program is slated to run from 3:15 pm to 5:15 pm, Monday through Thursday. It provides an hour of academic tutoring—help with homework and small group tutoring. After the first hour, students then are allowed to go into their 'special

interests' groups—band, athletics, arts and crafts, board games, etc. to complete their day. **Students in band, marching units, and the various athletic squads need to sign up.** Practice is held after

> academic lessons are completed. Snacks are provided each day.

All students participating must be registered in the program to stay after school. Bus service is provided home at 5:15. The program is FREE, but is limited to 250 students. Good

attendance and behavior are expected of all participants.

Students not adhering to the school's rules regarding behavioral expectations will be dropped from the program.

Academics Are Why We're Here!

It's important to reinforce the reason for school is to learn. Sometimes students forget!

Parents are asked to review the Family Handbook (fcwcs.org) with their scholars, paying close attention to the information regarding attendance, grades and participation in extracurriculum activities (see pages 1, 2, 4, and 5 of the Family Handbook).

Students enrolled in Kedila's Afterschool program have one hour (60 minutes) to complete

homework assignments. That may not be enough time to complete the assignment, so parents should ask their child if they finished their assignments and actually ask them to show it to you.

We have an abundance of clubs and organizations on campus. Students who are members of these groups must meet all behavior and academic requirements to remain a part of the organization (see pg. 4 of handbook for further details).

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What does that mean? The school and the home work together for the success of every child in our care. Our goals should be the same, doing what is best for the child's interest—academically, physically, mentally, and emotionally. When the child achieves, the family, school, and community prosper.





Is your scholar a 'finicky eater'?

Because we are a Title 1 school, every student is able to receive free breakfast and lunch without paying. Also, parents do not have to complete the federal forms required in non-Title 1 schools. But, if your child doesn't eat what the school provides, they may go the entire day hungry. The school's website (fcwcs.org) contains the monthly menus for both breakfast and lunch.

Familiarize yourself with the website for the information you need. **Breakfast, lunch,** and **snack menu** for **2025-2026** can be found by clicking the tab with the words listed above in bold. It is located above the school supplies lists.

Decide which days your child would enjoy a hot meal. If you see something your scholar won't eat or can't (because of allergies) be sure to prepare something for them.






