Dear Warrior Parents/Guardians,



Cold and flu season is upon us. Health Heroes will be on campus on the 23rd of October to give flu shots. Parental consent must be submitted.

The latest info I have is that COVID shots can be given in Louisiana without a prescription. According to the CDC (Center for Disease Control), it is safe to administer to children. On the CDC's website (cdc.gov), they highlight six facts about children and the COVID vaccine. They are as follows:

- COVID-19 vaccination is safe for children.
- 2. Getting vaccinated helps protect children against the virus.
- 3. Children may have some side effects after the vaccination.
- 4. Children receive a smaller dose of the vaccine than teens and adults.
- 5. Children who have already had COVID-19 should still get vaccinated. However, the vaccination should be delayed 3 months from when the symptoms started or, if they did not have symptoms, when they received a positive test.
- Children can safely receive other vaccines the same day they receive their COVID-19 vaccine.

Parents know their child(ren) best. Confer with your child's pediatrician to do what is best for your Warrior.

Did you know... "Herd Immunity" only happens when at least 95% of the population of a family, school, community is immunized against a disease? That's how we protect those who can't be vaccinated!

Please do not send sick children to school.

We put a lot of effort into making our 2 hours of after school activities worth our Warrior's time. The first hour (3:15-4:15) is dedicated to academics—homework assistance and/or tutoring. It might not provide all the time needed to complete assignments, so parents will need to ensure that homework is completed when students arrive home.

The second hour (4:15-5:15), is our student's favorite! It's when the activities aforementioned dominate the building! Every student enrolled gets to choose what activities they wish to participate in. The grant that was written to secure this funding has to be followed to a "t"!

Monday through Thursday is Kedila AfterSchool Program days at Fannie C.

We use this program to enrich our students academically, physically,

emotionally, and socially. We appreciate parents who signed their child(ren) up as requested. Please remember, this program is designed for 250 students. Students with behavioral or attendance problems will lose their spots. We have a waiting list!

The following items should be noted about the after school program:

Kedila AfterSchool Program happens:

- Monday through Thursday, October 'til April 2026;
- 2. Cost is free (federal/state funding);
- 3. Snacks provided to all enrollees;
- 4. Behavior and attendance expectations are the same as the same as the traditional school day, 7:30-3:00 pm;
- 5. Miss three days and you will lose your spot (we having a waiting list);
- 6. Bus service provided for the following zip codes only-70126, 70127, 70128, 70129;
- 7. Kids living out the above zip code must be picked up by their parents;
- 8. All car rides must be picked up no later than 5:30 pm.

Staff at FCW have been on duty since about 7:20 am. By 5:15 pm they are ready to head home to their families and responsibilities. Please adhere to the 5:30 pm pick-up.

















Students not registered can't stay.

It is designed to strengthen families and communities by using the humanities—what makes us humans (literature, the arts, philosophy). Designed for children ages 3-10, parents seem to love the program too! We do have Warriors who are on the older end who still love to come weekly. We






